

## Healing with dark forces

### *About the influence from negative energies or even entities in so called “spiritual healing.”*

There are several healers that offer spiritual healing of disease, such as through “laying on hands” or in other ways for transfer of healing power or even with spiritual means penetrate into the body of the client. The intention is to correct processes in the body or even “repair” organs, not only in the physical domain, but in the case psychosomatic causes also the psychological domain. To which extent karmic causes can be remedied that way will doubtlessly require that the patient gains insight and reconciliation with others on the soul level, and also with him(her)self. In nonconformist religious circles (such as Pentecostals) intercession prayers are practiced, for or with the sick person, referring to the marvelous healings performed by Jesus. Nonetheless they are often skeptic, rejecting or even condemning concerning healings outside of their circles. Overestimating themselves, their opinion is often that *only* they can heal spiritually and others not, and that there would only be charlatans outside their circles – deceivers or even diabolic activities. Such judgments are however not very Christian ... considering what Jesus himself said:

Mark 9:38-39: “Whosoever shall receive one of such children in my name, receiveth me: and whosoever shall receive me, receiveth not me, but him that sent me. And John answered him, saying, Master, we saw one casting out devils in thy name, and he followeth not us: and we forbid him, because he followeth not us. But Jesus said, forbid him not: for there is no man which shall do a miracle in my name, that can lightly speak evil of me.”

Seen in their view, it is understandable when many Christians condemn e.g. Reiki and want to see only the work of dark powers in it. Without going deeply into the subject, one may after all ask if it is really evil when a sincere Christian practices Reiki *in the name of Christ*. Would that not fall in the category of the above quotation of Jesus? Especially since Mikao Usui, the originator of Reiki, has claimed to be inspired by Christianity, even if his legacy more refers to Gautama Buddha. And even then: are there not remarkable parallels between the teachings of Buddha and Jesus?

I have, however, found information that gives me severe doubts in respect to what might be called “Christian Reiki.” It seems that we are here dealing with incompatible methods of healing. Searching for information, I found a truly repulsive text *The Little Book of Satanic Healing* and a website *Satanic Reiki*, which describe how one may open oneself for Satanic powers and also about a kind of energy called *seichim*, *sekhem* or *setim*, apparently according to a Patrick Zeigler, who claims to have been initiated to such a system in an Egyptian pyramid.<sup>1</sup> Then I found descriptions of it, which to me clearly show that this energy is the same as the one referred to in Reiki.

Another area of healing, which fundamental Christians often strictly condemn, is homeopathy. This mode of healing was developed by Samuel Hahnemann (1755-1843). Once, maybe some 50 years ago, I had a book from a Christian publisher in my hand (which I can no more find today) that claimed that Hahnemann was Jewish and that therefore this method would be condemnable, since he was not a Christian! What a nazi-inspired unchristian nonsense! In the first place, I find no reference about him as possibly being Jewish, secondly that would not make any difference in this context, nor in any other way. Thirdly it has been suggested that for that reason “occult energies” would be at work in homeopathy that could only be “dark.” What is really unchristian and Satanic is that fundamental sects usually *only* accept products of pharmaceutical industries, as if these would be god-inspired, whereas they in reality are inspired by a satanically materialistic addiction to profit and power.

There are, though, certain connections between homeopathy and masonry. Hahnemann was a freemason and member of the lodge „St. Andreas zu den drei Seeblättern“ in Hermannstadt, Transylvania (at

that time a German settlement in Romania, today called Sibiu). I will also not delve deeper into this subject but only remark that many connect occultism with demonic, even though this is not correct. “Occult” means *hidden* and not *demonic*. These *separate* concepts can actually overlap, but a general conclusion cannot be drawn. What is hidden is not openly recognizable to all of us, maybe simply because we so far have no “scientific” explanation. Even though dark forces can act within freemasonry, it would be overhasty and not fair to draw conclusions about homeopathy from that.

The scientific problem concerning how homeopathy could work cannot be solved within our three-dimensional world view, since the solution involves higher dimensions in God’s creation. Dimensions that one in today’s physics is aware of, but is not yet capable to adapt for understanding the problem out of this view.

Today’s physics will consistently agree to the opinion that the universe is multidimensional and contains several more dimensions than the three that are the only ones we Earth beings can perceive (with rare exceptions). Our perception is crippled and does not enable us to perceive more than these three. Every material substance also has aspects in other dimensions, which are hidden to us and there the explanation for the effect is to be found. Who has more than a superficial experience of homeopathy knows what one is not supposed to know: it really works. The discoveries of Masaru Emoto furthermore demonstrate that there is much more in water than our physics wants to be true.

Beyond that, the “guiding principle” *similia similibus curantur* is to be understood in the sense that a substance that makes the body react similarly to a certain disease can in a very small dose stimulate and mobilize the *body’s defense* (immunity) against it.

### **Powers of light and darkness in healing procedures**

There will doubtlessly be both. I begin with an extreme case that was uncovered in 2018. An earlier “famous” Brazilian healer is João de Deus who attracted hordes of people in the hope of becoming healed. Actually, there seems to have been a few really spectacular healings among them.

In relation to “spiritual healing” and even sexual abuse of women and children there was a shocking revelation about him in Brazil. João Teixeira de Faria (called João de Deus or “John of God”) has during many years practiced “spiritual surgery” with impressing and even spectacular interventions. Then it became known that he requested sexual “return services” from some, female clients and even that he held sex slaves imprisoned in a manner that reminds of the scandal about Marc Dutroux in Belgium, and *sold* their children! He then was brought to justice and in the court scary spook phenomena were reported to occur. Some electronic equipment did not work or behaved in a peculiar manner. It was reported that “When a policeman wanted to type the statement of the healer in the official computer, all keys produced only zeros a while, filling the screen with them. Then the printer began to print wildly by itself and a cable began to burn until a refrigerator connected to it exploded.”

The accusation was brought up by a Brazilian woman Sabrina de Campos Bittencourt who was later found dead in Barcelona, allegedly from suicide. How can all that be possible?

Whether the reader believes it or not, there are in the creation hordes of negative entities that are “at home” in other dimensions and therefore invisible to us. They have strong powers which enable them to cause phenomena that we may experience as spooky (and they are consulted in black magic). They actually can heal! Not out of benevolence or even love – as positive entities (angels) do – but for profit. They are not interested in positive results but do it if they are “well paid”, for instance (as in his case) through trafficking and sacrifices. Thus they have “assisted” João de Deus and taken revenge on Sabrina Bittencourt for sabotaging their business. I assume that they killed her! If they can heal, they can also kill...

Here we can see how important it is to judge a “spiritual healer” before consulting him! In the first place by means of how you feel with him. Do you feel good with his presence or is there also a bit of an eerie feeling? Does he heal *in the name of Christ*? There are certainly true healers among us, especially those who expressly refer to Christ.

There are various religious movements in Brazil that are mixed with African religions brought with the earlier slavery. Among them are *umbanda*, which to a major extent apparently contains Christian elements, *quimbanda* with some form of magic, *macumba* and *candomblé*. These will have certain relations to the Haitian *voodoo*, probably *umbanda* less than the others. When a healer is connected with *quimbanda*, *macumba* or *candomblé*, there might be a possibility that he is assisted by negative powers, but hopefully less in the case of *umbanda*.

Brazilian healers performing radical “spiritual surgery” came into the headlines much earlier. The soul of a Dr. Adolf Fritz (said to have died in Estonia 1918) has allegedly taken over the body of a series of healers temporarily, being in trance, to perform remarkable interventions. Among them were José (Zé) Arigó, Edivaldo de Oliveira Silva and his brother called Oscar Wilde, Maurício Magalhães, the real physician Edson Cavalcante Queiroz and more. I have seen a video recording of Queiroz in which he, while “Dr. Fritz” was in him, spoke Portuguese with a strong German accent, but otherwise not. These healers allegedly had several cases of radical operations with unsterilized instruments and yet sensational success.

It has also been reported that the body of João de Deus has occasionally been taken over by an unidentified soul or entity. It would in that case surely be a negative entity...

### **Philippine healers**

Much was written and said about the Philippine healers in the 1970es and 1980es. I was there once myself and saw much that I could only explain as paranormal. The media tried to explain this away by various means as fake. My opinion is that there are really were, and probably still are, healers who could go inside the body with the hand (and similar things), but also some who performed fake “operations.” The difference will be that the true healer who really has such powers is modest and demands nothing but is satisfied with what he is given. Who, however, in this sees a way to become rich and *abuses his powers will lose them*, after which he may try to keep his image with tricks. There was in only in one case a rumor about animal sacrifice (but not human), which would indicate dark energies. Beyond that, it all gave the impression of a Christian atmosphere.

### **The situation in Europe**

Since there are persons in Europe, who knowingly or unknowingly approach spiritual areas that are satanic or luciferian, it will not be impossible that a few of them have become consciously or unconsciously “assisted” by entities in a healing or similar activity. In such a case, the healer may have success without understanding what he (or she) will have to pay for it when one day (in any case after the death of the body) the bill is presented. In many such cases, the healer has unknowingly sold his or her soul to the dark forces and will now have to serve these forces, and that in a way he did not expect. When he later reincarnates again, these powers do not let him go but require servitude to them also in the new lifetime. This has actually been observed in some cases of regression experiences.

Another area in this respect concerns channelings, in which allegedly an entity speaks through a medium and may in some cases answer questions about health. The advice may be helpful, or in some cases not. If not, the advice could even be harmful since the health does not improve. It is important to separate the chaff from the wheat. Is a good entity speaking or a deceiving one?

In my opinion, the most important test is to ask: “Are you coming in the name of Christ?” Better still specifying: “...in the name of the true Christ” (and not of a fake Christ). It probably cannot be excluded that a negative entity lies about that, but it would rather avoid the question: “Why do you ask that?” (or similarly), but that is enough as an answer! Who wants a religiously more neutral formulation could say: “...in the love of the original creator?”

### **Soul exchange**

A peculiar way for healing in the case of a disease is the exchange of the soul. It may first be mentioned that there are strange cases of multiple personality in which the health state switches according to which personality comes forward. That will be a matter of attached souls changing from one

to another. That phenomenon is very rare but it has been observed. If one of these personalities has a specific health problem and not another, the problem disappears when the other soul takes over. I have never experienced such a case myself, but the following comes close. What is a *walk-in*? It is a complete soul exchange and not a form of multiple personality switching souls, while the others remain in the background. In the case of a *walk-in*, the earlier soul has definitely left the body and a new one has taken over to stay. It then could happen that the first soul had a health problem which the new soul does not need to have – e.g., because it has another karma –and the disease is simply no more there after the exchange.

I had a case of a woman who had been operated for cancer and during the surgery the soul left and another came in to replace it, and that was the *real reason* why the cancer disappeared and not the operation (that, seeing it that way, was unnecessary). This is how it was explained in the regression. The new soul had another karma.

It may therefore be theoretically possible to perform a healing by means of replacing the soul – through which the personality would change accordingly, gradually rather than immediately. It is known from “accidental” cases of *walk-in* (in which a person was clinically dead and the soul left, but another took over and revived the body) that there is initially a kind of conflict. The brain still has full memories of the life before the incident, but with the new soul comes new interests, new talents or abilities, a compulsion to live differently from before (usually better but rarely worse). Then the health also changes accordingly. A partnership can then also change and not rarely become better but possibly worse, since the souls that once married are no more together, but only the bodies.

### **Soul scalping**

In the case of a violent soul exchange one talks about *soul scalping*. The concept appears to have been first used by Sherry Shriner<sup>2</sup> about whom there was much controversy (in my opinion not without reasons). Some of what she wrote and talked about in videos agrees with my own view, but not all (this concerns “alternative” views in relation to Christianity). What she wrote about *soul scalping* has been adopted by other websites. So what is that, then? It has to do with a peculiar alleged practice in certain secret societies, such as the Illuminati, to by force and with the aid of entities remove the soul of a person and replace it with another. It is not known what then happens to the original soul. For a not explained reason, the person may then have “black eye” from some kind of intervention for performing the process.

I assume that one has there caused some injury (that then heals again) for the purpose of breaking through his aura. A lesion can temporarily cause a “hole” in the aura. Thus one may get access to the soul. It is remarkable that quite a few politicians and celebrities have been seen with a “black eye” and one talks jokingly about a *black eye club*, speculating about initiation ceremonies in some secret society. It is supposed that in this manner the souls of leading personalities are replaced with new ones – souls of people who died, or entities – that should then take power over the physical person. Or another soul or entity may possibly be added to the existing one to function as a symbiont that shall control the person according to the interests of an organization like the Illuminati, or a group of entities or extraterrestrials.

As has been mentioned, the health condition of a person will usually change when another soul takes over. That raises the questions if this may be achieved for the purpose of healing? As an intention of the healer, or unconsciously and unknowingly to him? In any case it would be conscious to an “assisting” entity... There are cases in which one may assume this to have happened due to personality changes.

On July 15, 2017, Steven Mineo was shot by his girlfriend Barbara Rogers in Coolbaugh Township, Pennsylvania, after a conflict about a statement by Sherry Shriner, bringing Shriner into the headlines, exposed as leader of a sect of which the two appeared to be members. But it was not a sect, they were in reality supporting readers of her website. Yet Shriner came into disrepute because of this. There may today be some uncertainty whether “Sherry Shriner” was her real name or maybe a pseudonym. Could she have staged her “death” as a way to get out of this?

It is obvious that a soul replacement must never occur without agreement of the client, but what if the healer does not know what happens?

### **Russian healers**

There are and have been Russian healers about which amazing things have been reported. Evgenia Yuvashevna Davitashvili (Евгѳенія Ювѳшевна Давиташвѳли, better known as Dzhuna or Djuna [Джуна], 1949-2015) was especially famous. I will here only mention a few persons in relation to a special case in the year 2017.

The Russian healer Grigori Petrovich Grabovoy<sup>3</sup> claims to be able to bring the dead back to life. He describes a few examples in a book. A woman asked him to bring back her son who had died four months earlier. Almost two weeks later she began to feel the presence of her son in her house and went to his grave, in which she saw a crack and some excavation in the earth. In the following night, she saw two bright connections between her breast and the grave. She had maintained a friendly relation to the ex-wife of her son after their divorce, who during a train ride clearly saw the son – her ex-husband – in the compartment. He appeared to look exactly as he did before he died and his behavior was the same. But he apparently did not recognize his ex-wife and was accompanied by a man who seemed to have some sort of influence over him. When he saw a ruble banknote that had come in circulation after the death of the ex-husband, he did not recognize it.

What happened here? Was his soul in the train compartment? Or did she only see a kind of a hologram of the body he had had? Clearly, his soul will have left the body in the grave. Where it was in that moment cannot be concluded from this story. If it was in another dimension that we call the world of light: Was it then brought into the train, maybe even against its will? The body of the man was in the grave and one may imagine that some not too much decomposed body cells (especially of the nervous system) may in some energetic form have kept “residual memories”, and then it could be possible that the “healer” could extract information from them through a process unknown to us (but maybe not to Grabovoy). And who was the man accompanying him that seemed to have some influence over him? Possibly a kind of a manifested entity? In any case it could not have been the ex-husband sitting near, him but possibly a kind of a zombie. Reports about voodoo-rituals tell about comparable phenomena and one may in this case assume something similar.

Another question arises: Where is that “revived person” today? Nothing further is told about him and it looks like what the ex-wife saw in the train was a kind of a temporary copy of the man, maybe connected with some extracted “residual memories” (see above).

We may also ask about the intention with all this. It is a *mischief* to make such a show for the selfish satisfaction of those still alive and their ignorance. They should be told that one should leave his soul in its immortality and that it is (in most cases) much better off in the soul state as it ever was while incorporated, and that it should be left in peace. They should also be told the fact that there is no death and that we will meet again some day. Everything else rather seems to me as blasphemous nonsense.

Grabovoy was 2008 condemned to 11 years in prison for fraud (after a prolonged time in custody) because of dubious methods of healing and because he requested 10% of the income from persons who use his methods and furthermore promised people to bring back the dead at a very high cost (40 000 ruble or almost US\$ 600). He was let free in 2010 after an intervention by Russian lawyers. It is told that he even claimed to be God or Jesus returned... One may, though, keep in mind that he could also have been subject to slander, yet if he should really have claimed to be one in the long line of “returned Jesusses”, the word “megalomaniac” easily comes to mind.

Something that strikes my mind in Grabovoy’s book is that he shows some 25 certificates and diplomas in it, and on top of it a considerable number of witness statements, which will be intended to increase his credibility. It may be explainable in view of law actions against him, but it makes an exaggerated impressing. Does he really need that?

I do not want to discredit him with these lines but a healthy measure of skepticism will be in place here, well supported by the “revival” reports...

Some have wanted to compare his “revivals” with the one of Lazarus in the Bible (John 11:11 ff) who was revived by Jesus in a cave after four days. The gospels tell more about him so that it is known that Lazarus was seen alive after the revival. These stories can, however, not really be compared. What Jesus did, he did in his own initiative without being asked to do it, and he requested nothing for it. He simply had compassion for the weeping persons and will have seen that the “silver thread” between body and soul was not broken.

Grabovoy has developed a remarkable method for healing, a kind of homeopathy with numbers. For each form of disease, a numerical code is given. This is another matter to which I cannot really comment concerning meaningfulness and effect, but rather repeat the saying: “Who heals is right.” Science-minded persons will state that this is impossible, but in the first place because it does not fit in their world view. That is their opinion also about homeopathy as well as about Philippine healers. As concerns Grabovoy’s approach, I cannot really comment more than that “digital healing” is alienating in a world with increasing digitalization of humanity that on the whole does not seem to be a good development, especially in view of the Satanic horror of artificial intelligence...

There is a difference between, on one side, physical revival – involving a maybe forceful return of a soul that has just left a body – and, on the other side, regeneration as a result of healing of a body that still has a soul (even though it may be unconscious). Unless it is a case of *walk-in* (see above), in which the body is revived by *another* soul. The latter could, however, not explain the case of “the man the train” (unless the body was teleported from the grave into the train in a healed state...).

Another remarkable Russian author is Arkadiy Petrov who had a very special experience as he in 1996 was dying in a hospital. This to me seems to be an impressive near-death experience in which the soul temporarily left the body and he then had experienced a kind of “enlightenment.” He was completely healed by it. In one of his books he, in my view, also mentions Grabovoy indiscriminately and uncritically mentions the “revivals.” He in visions experienced the life of Jesus, yet in a manner that does not really convince me. Did he somehow witness Jesus’ life or has he had a past life in his environment? Or was it a kind of hallucination? I have, for example, a problem with the idea of a conflict between Jesus and John the Baptist (as has Petrov himself), as if John’s attitude to Jesus would have been somewhat negative (or maybe he was a bit jealous on him). Petrov had in his first experience an encounter with a negative and hateful entity, who to me appears luciferian or satanic. Did it want to influence him?

Petrov also wrote in the first book of his trilogy about a Ukrainian healer Vyacheslav Lapshin (Вячеслав Лапшин), whose appearance to him was a bit demonic. Did he want to influence Petrov? He talked about a biocomputer as a “certain entity”, which in view of “digital healing” (see above) is alienating to me. A superdimensional “artificial intelligence)? The books by Petrov are rather interesting but may be a bit specious and there may be something else behind of which also Petrov himself is not aware. Could it be that Petrov became a *walk-in* during his experience in the hospital?

### **Eternal physical life**

Grabovoy is of the opinion that the human being of the future will have eternal *physical* life, that means *physical* immortality. We would then forever be in this prison for the soul... It might be possible by means of *material* developments to keep the *body* forever healthy and in optimal function ... but always the same body and always being the same person within a *limited* frame of development opportunities. He obviously does not realize that *we are from the beginning of our existence immortal beings as souls* that go from one body to another, through which our souls develop more and so much faster, and gradually vanquish the physical until we no more need it. The idea of an eternal *physical* life is horrible! A material hell for an incarcerated soul, trapped within the limits of a three-dimensional region of the multidimensional universe, with no access to other dimensions. Grabovoy’s philosophy is too much fixed on the materially physical and disregards the soul. Of course we are considering the body in matters of health, but the soul is far above it!

It appears that he does not consider the consequences of physical immortality. Our planet is already overpopulated and how would it then be if human bodies would live eternally? If humans no more transgress through what is called death to reach other and higher forms of existence and thus leave a place free in the material realm, where would all these increasing numbers of bodies live? Or should we no more be allowed to have children to keep the number of bodies reasonably constant? What would then happen to all the souls who can no more incarnate here?

In an interview, Grabovoy claims to be working on novel equipment in space research. Among them is a “technical device PRK-1U for rejuvenation, clairvoyance, prognosis and eternal life.” But one cannot try it out without first deciding to buy it (US\$ 10700)! Proverbially “buying a pig in a poke”...

As a conclusion, I cannot exclude the possibility that Grabovoy is influenced by rather negative entities which, however, may “help” him to have real results in healing.

### **Oleg Lohnes**

Oleg Lohnes (Олег Лohnec) lives in Germany. I here may refer to a criticizing article on the German website *Psiram*. It is common practice for that website to rip asunder everything that has to do with esoterics, alternative medicine, paranormal phenomena and forms of religious belief, accepting only what fits between the blinkers of a constrained official science and nothing else. Read with a healthy mind, the website is nevertheless informative if you separate the chaff from the wheat. Usually the mere facts are valid, but their evaluation is tendentious and you have to draw your own conclusions. Anyway, what is there written about Lohnes stirs up doubtful thoughts... to me it seems that he is “from the same school” as Grabovoy.

### **A case in Germany**

June 30, 2017, Michael Friedrich Vogt had a serious cerebral hemorrhage (apparently from an aneurysm). According to the hospital report, he was admitted in an “early comatose state, being artificially ventilated. On July 5 a good dissolution of the blood clot was observed. Since one could expect that the comatose state would continue, a tracheotomy was performed July 11 for ventilation. Until he was released July 20, he was increasingly awake and responsive.” The prognosis was that he – if he would survive – “...and become awake after months or maybe even years, he would be seriously invalid, not able to walk, talk or eat by himself.”

In this situation, Oleg Lohnes came to the rescue and began giving remote healing that rather soon contributed to Vogt’s complete recovery, who commented as follows: “*Already after a short time, I had a new body, a new brain and a new lung that after 50 years finally is now completely free from asthma.*”

Here I must ask myself if there had *possibly* been a soul exchange that made him feel like he had a new brain? The liberation from asthma could also be an indication of that. As is known from experiences with regression therapy (and that will be rejected by *Psiram* and many a reader) asthma in many cases (and not all) may result from having died from suffocation in a past life. I am aware that there will be readers who do not accept such an explanation, but such has the regression experience been in several such cases where the asthma was gone afterwards. If another soul should have replaced the original one in this case, this soul would probably not have experienced dying from suffocation in an earlier incarnation.

It can now be expected that one will pull all strings to establish an explanation of his medical records in a way that fits official medicine, but in any case not a “paranormal” one...

As concerns Grabovoy and Petrov, it will in my opinion also be cases of “paranormal” experiences in the sense that they occurred on a soul level, which may not be conscious to the healer.

Now a thought wants to come to my mind even though I try to reject it, but it comes again. Under “References” (below) there is a link to a video with an interview by Vogt with Grabovoy, shown in the YouTube channel „Querdenken TV“ at the end of July 2017. The video obviously was recorded *before* the incident at the end of June that year. Could it be (or is that a too wild idea of mine?) that there is a connection between: Interview [Grabovoy] > hemorrhage > healing [by a colleague of

Grabovoy] in a rather short sequence. It might almost look as if one (from somewhere...) wanted this to happen to enable a soul exchange – but in that case: What for??

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
